
News of our speakers



In Order to Live' by Yeonmi Park

Penguin (2015) ISBN 978-0-241-97303-5

The harrowing story of a teenage girl's escape from North Korea. The clarity of Yeomni's writing immediately transports the reader to the harsh realities of daily life in North Korea in the 1990s and the dangers facing those who try to leave. Yeonmi gives a vivid account of her escape across the frozen Yalu River and her heart-breaking experiences of being trafficked by gang masters in China. She takes a terrifying journey across the Gobi Desert into

Mongolia, following the stars for direction. She describes her arrival in South Korea, and the difficulties she encounters integrating into this society, with humanity and courage.

Yeomni has now become a human rights activist and outspoken critic of North Korea.
